TEXT OF THE CYCLE

1. HARMONY

In the meadow I lie, the silver stream flowing by. The sky is soft and blue. My soul gets still, still and calm.

Across the stream cattle graze, a maze of white dotting the verdant plain, like the fluffy clouds across the azure sky.

The shepherd's tune glides over the gentle breeze that stirs the grass and caresses my face. The song falls upon my ears like gentle dew and joins the trio of the breeze, the field, and the stream.

And I am gently lulled into harmony and

The morn is taking her golden bath; The dew is climbing away. Beyond the rise, the old shepherd comes, leading his flock on its daily round.

"Old shepherd, your flock is white like cotton."
"I take good care of it."
"Old shepherd, don't work today your flock is fat."
"Then it would grow lean."
"Old Shepherd, why do you blow so off your tuneful pipe?"
"It cheers the heart and nourishes the spirit
and makes me remember the shepherd who takes care of me."

3. KITES

The kites are flying again.

The rains have said their farewell.

Happy children play in swinging branches.

Merrily gurgles the blue stream.

See, the western sky wears it amber raiment, and fair maids return from the stream with rolling hips and happy, happy songs.

Life is good.

Life is bright.

My spirit soars like floating kites above.

Life is a gift, a blessing from God.

He brings back the season of merry and cheer!

4. HEALING

The wound, it smarts and tears at me! It won't heal. Am I losing my senses? Innate order slipping through my fingers: the tempest rages and tears at the calm.

Sharp fingers of yellow light grope through the dark, searching out the tunnel, a quest for sense.

I saw the flower open up her golden self to suck in the sunny glow of the sky. I saw the gentle drops of rain revive the withering grass. I felt the breeze; I saw the rippling waves rolling upon the lolling surface of the blue sea.

Then I heard it, like a whisper, a single drop of word:
Peace.

5. SILENCE

When these trees stand silently, tall, reaching to the sky with bare arms, naked, devoid of clothing, what do they say?

Do they proclaim the death of love?

No, maybe they sing the silent song of love. Look above them, see the blue sky, tinged with soft hues of grey; see how they reflect its glory.

Look beyond them, see the solid buildings, clothed in slabs of concrete and shiny marble:

Hear them sing a sweet lullaby, a serenade of love.

Come, come! Hark, all nature sings.

Yonder mountains in purple are dressed.

Its feathers of rainbow that hovering bird displays.

Wafted on the gentle breeze, the piper's tune I hear.

And mingled with the rhythm of this soft purling brook, it is a song of praise and love.

Glory, glory, it is the song all nature sings.

Glory, glory unto the maker of all things.

The song is ringing; the fields are dancing.

Glory, glory to God!

The song is sweetly ringing, creation's grand sonnet unending, boldly proclaiming God's glory and praise.

Come adoring,

Come let us sing

Loud praises God

Who made heaven and earth

and clothed them with beauty.

Sing God's glory,

Sing God's glory

Who in splendor surpasses them all.

The fields are blooming,

and the trees are clapping.

All nature praises the Lord.

8. MELODY

Sing your melody, sweet singing bird, my listening ears attend with rapture. Waft your twirling notes upon the air and cause the troubled heart to cease its panting and bid its cares to fly to the realm of darkest night.

For here your notes enchant and lull to peace the soul who hears your song.

Sing, sing your melody, sweet singing bird, The One who gave you voice inspires the song you sing. Sing, sing, your notes attune the ear to hear his voice.

9. SANCTUARY

When through nature's sanctuary you walk And in awe behold its beauty and grandeur, Pause you may to meditate on this wonder.

But beware, beware of what you worship. Bow the knee to the creator alone. Give praise to the architect. Fair nature you may admire, But to God alone, to God alone You may bow the knee.

10. GRACE

God, give me the grace to be humble, to give glory to you, not to myself.

It is God who works in us to will and to do, to do what is right and pleasing.

Not to me, not to me, but to you alone be the glory, and honor, and dominion forever.

Dr. Ishaya Yarison is part of a group of composers of African descent who seek to promote a genre of music called African Art Music, music that highlights topics and themes from Africa. Yarison works in a variety of forms, including opera, instrumental music, vocal music, and choral music. His sacred opera, I AM Meditation, was featured by the National Opera Association in 2014. He has received commissions and performances in the UK and works as a church musician in the Twin Cities. "Sanctuary" is one of three song cycles Yarison has composed. He currently teaches at the University of St. Thomas, Saint Paul, Minnesota.

BA from Nihon University, Tokyo, Japan and MM from the University of Minnesota, privately studied with Camille Maurane, a legendary Baryton Martin in Paris and Elizabeth Mannion in St. Paul. Performed with the Guthrie, Theatre de la Jeune Lune, Chanhassen Dinner Theatres, Theater Mu, Mixed Precipitations, In the Heart of the Beast Puppet Theatre, and more. Momoko has worked with the Glocal Mission Collective for the ELCA for ten years, and has been a voice faculty member at University of Wisconsin River Falls and St. Paul Conservatory for Performing Artists and will be a soloist for the Messiah with Dakota Symphony Orchestra in December.
